Vocabulary

Character: A person portrayed in an artistic piece, such as a drama or novel.

Emperor Penguin: The largest species of penguin (Aptenodytes forsteri). It has a yellow patch on each side of the head and rears its young during the Antarctic winter.

Walrus: A large gregarious marine mammal (Odobenus rosmarus), having two large downward-pointing tusks and found in the Arctic Ocean.

Polar Bear: A large white arctic bear (Thalarctos maritimus) that lives

mainly on the pack ice. It is a strong swimmer and feeds mostly on seals.

Musical: A play or movie in which singing and dancing play an essential part. Musicals developed from light opera in the early 20th century.

Narrator: A person who delivers commentary accompanying art, music, novels, movies, etc.

South Pole: The southern end of the earth's axis of rotation, a point in Antarctica.

Post-Performance Activities

- 1. Assign students to choose an animal from the South Pole that they have to write their own story about using one of the character traits they learn.
- 2. Watch the movie "March of the Penguins".
- 3. Take kids to the library and allow them to go through the Hans Christian Anderson website, http://andersenfairytales.com/en/ma in. This website has information about Mr. Andersen and other tales in an animated form.
